Delegation to Colombia

March 21-27, 2020







Connect with early childhood professionals and fellow NAEYC members in Colombia. Led by Isauro M. Escamilla Calan, member of the NAEYC Governing Board, this program will give you a unique opportunity to learn about early childhood education in Colombia, exchange experiences with like-minded peers, and reflect on the similarities and differences with your context.

In 2016, the Government of Colombia announced the end of the civil unrest that had plagued their country for more than 50 years. Since that time, the government has aimed to further the peace and stability of Colombian civil society through advancing its education, healthcare, and family welfare structures. Although, there have been rumblings from the revolutionary side in the past months, the peace remains intact and leaders from both sides remain committed to a peaceful Colombia. Early childhood education is an integral part of their plans to improve the education foundation. The initial successful programs have focused on the vulnerable and disadvantaged populations. These programs expanded the number and quality of early childhood education (ECE) programs in the urban communities. Access to public ECE programs in rural areas is the next hurdle. Join us for an in-depth experience to learn about their bold strategy and some of the promising early findings that can inform our practice.



LEADER BIOGRAPHY

Isauro M. Escamilla Calan is an early childhood educator at Las Americas Early Education School, a dual language preschool in the San Francisco Unified School District. He has authored a number of articles and book chapters on teacher inquiry and documentation in early childhood education. Isauro was elected to serve a four-year-term as a member of the NAEYC Governing Board in 2016. In addition to working as an early childhood educator, Isauro teaches undergraduate classes at San Francisco State University on second language acquisition, and observation and assessment practices in early education. He is currently a doctoral student in the Educational Leadership Ed.D program at San Francisco State University. Since 2010, Isauro and Dr. Daniel Meier have facilitated an inquiry group with teachers at Las Americas EES. Monthly meetings serve as a forum to engage in active reflections about the teachers' roles as early childhood educators with the goal of improving their teaching practices. Isauro brings a unique perspective and deep experience that will ensure we engage in robust dialogue while absorbing the wonders of Colombia.

- Early Childhood Professionals Who comprises the workforce in Colombia, and what are the standards for Colombian early childhood teacher training programs?
- Quality How are early learning programs regulated, monitored, and evaluated?
 How do Colombians address socioeconomic differences between urban and rural schools?
- **Language Learning** How are issues of linguistic and social-cultural diversity addressed in early childhood education practices?
- Formative Assessment of Child Progress How do Colombian teachers assess children's learning? How is assessment used in the planning and implementation of classroom activities? Is there a system of early intervention?

DAY 1Arrive throughout the day by individual arrangements to Bogotá, Colombia. Evening introductory program briefing.

Tour the city of Bogotá, including the National

Capitol and Casa de Nariño, the presidential house,
and key museums. Visit Mount Monserrate, the iconic
symbol of Bogotá, and the sanctuary at its summit.

Introduction to the Colombian education system and international programs by the Ministry of Education. Learn about Colombia's education strategy, goals, and challenges for the next ten years. Meet with faculty and students at the National University of Colombia School of Education and Learning.

Visit an early childhood education center and community childcare program to observe the work of educators and childcare professionals.

Travel to the town of Zipaquirá, which means "City of our Father" in the language of the Chibcha people, to visit the famed Salt Cathedral, built 180 meters below the surface. In the afternoon, visit a local school offering an early childhood education program.

Visit La Palma y El Tucán farm outside of Bogotá to learn about the day-to-day activities of the farm, which produces award-winning gourmet coffee. Reflect on your week with representatives of the Ministry of Education and some of the professionals you met throughout the week.

Depart or continue on an optional program extension.

The program will be finalized based on the guidance of the delegation leader, the interests and composition of the group, and the scheduling needs of hosting resources in country.
